Denise:

At the time we created the trails I believe it was my Dad's intent that these trails would be used by the residents of Foxhall for horse trails, or walking.

Les, who owned two 5 acre lots in Foxhall asked if he could board horses there and use the trails. At the time the trails were not being used and the weeds were growing up. Les was a good friend of ours and my Dad felt that would a good way at least keep the weeds down. Les had a small operation and my Dad felt if it became a problem Les would understand and take the appropriated action.

My Dad did not think that that use would grow into a larger operation that would upset the residents. It solved a problem at that time. Les was always respectful of the neighbors and was well liked.

Another property owner to the west of Foxhall wanted to us the trails for his boarding stable but Dad told his he couldn't use them.

His name was Sandy Mackie, but he no longer lives there.

I don't think Dad thought or wanted the use to grow and become a problem. If Dad would have wanted horse boarding and non-residents to use the trails beyond the small use that Les had, he would have changed the covenants while he still had a majority of the lots under his ownership.

Sorry I don't remember more details, but it was a long time ago.
